2024 BUDGET VOTE & TRUSTEE ELECTION

THURSDAY, SEPTEMBER 14 AT THE LIBRARY 7 AM-9 PM

What am I voting for?

The proposed 2024 library budget and the election of two Clifton Park Trustees to the Library Board. The Library Board of Trustees is made up of 11 elected representatives, seven from Clifton Park and four from Halfmoon. Trustees serve a five-year term and are elected by each town's residents. There are currently two open trustee positions created by the expiring terms of Stephen Meyer and Purushothaman Srinivasan, both representing the town of Clifton Park.

Where will the voting be held?

The vote will take place at the Library, 475 Moe Road, from **7 AM-9 PM on Thursday**, **September 14** as prescribed by our legislated charter.

Who's eligible to vote?

Registered voters, including renters and property owners, in the towns of Clifton Park and Halfmoon who live within the Library District. **Proof of identity is required.**

Renovations offer improvements.

One of the largest groups of visitors to the Library are undoubtedly the children--from babies and preschoolers to school-aged children. During the ongoing renovation of the very popular and cherished Children's Library, dedicated library staff maintained

their unwavering commitment to delivering the highest level of programs and services to these important visitors. The result was an increase in program attendance and record numbers of participants in our Summer Reading Challenge. The improvements to the Children's Library will offer a cozy and welcoming area, encouraging children to learn, explore, and become lifelong readers.

Your Library remains committed to being a green building.

With the world around us moving towards greater sustainability, the Library continues its mission to be as environmentally friendly as possible. This year, four electric vehicle (EV) charging stations were installed at no cost to taxpayers. The pay-per-use EV stations were made possible through grants secured by library staff and the generosity of the Friends of the Library. Another environmental, cost-saving initiative is to forego mailing an expensive budget information brochure this year, and to make it available in the Library and on our website. This step will not only save money and resources, but also help reduce waste.

The proposed budget reflects our commitment to maximizing the value of every dollar while providing access to resources and services that foster personal growth, learning, and community connections. We extend our heartfelt gratitude to you, the community members who have continually demonstrated support of the Library. Your enthusiasm, engagement, and generosity have allowed the Library to provide exceptional service to all who enter our doors.

BY THE NUMBERS

- On average, more than 190 new cardholders each month.
- Nearly 50,000 items per month are checked out, including print, digital, and audiovisual materials.
- Visitors to the Library are steadily increasing; more than 5,000 visitors each week.
- Program attendance has almost reached pre-pandemic levels.
- 150,000+ items in our collection, including nontraditional items such as telescopes, hiking backpacks, boards games, and more.
- English Language Learning & Citizenship classes have doubled in size with students representing more than a dozen countries.
- Since resuming in 2022, almost 1,000 tutoring hours have been dedicated to helping ELL students.
- 40+ One-on-one Tech Help appointments to date.
- Computer and technology offerings expanded to include targeted workshops for seniors, live webinars for professional development, in addition to continued classes for kids, teens, and adults.
